SP Brewery announced this decision on Thursday 7th May 2020.

The PNGRFL has confirmed that the 2020 season will continue but in a revised format, between May 1st and October 31st, 2020.

Speaking during the press conference, SPB Managing Director, Ed Weggemans said:

GRIEVING wife Leah Wafi Tovere told yesterday of how her husband, the late Snr Insp Andrew Tovere, had bought food he would prepare for Mother's Day, before leaving for work on Friday.

He never returned home to prepare the special Sunday meal he had promised her, after he was allegedly assaulted by off-duty soldiers at the ATS settlement on Saturday.

"He bought some cartons of meat on Friday, brought it to the house, and told me to put it in the fridge so that we could celebrate with other mothers in the compound on Mother's Day (yesterday)," she said.

"On Friday night, before leaving for his shift, he said he would be back by 5am on Saturday. So I woke up early and made breakfast for him.

"But he didn't come home at 5am. Then at around 7am, some policemen came and told me that I had to get his change of clothes and to go with them immediately to the hospital."

He died at around 2pm on Saturday at the Port Moresby General Hospital.

As mothers around the country and the world celebrated their special Sunday yesterday, Leah Tovere, 29, the mother of three children from East Sepik, was in mourning.

"It was a shock and I still can't accept that he's gone. He left without saying goodbye or telling me how I was to raise our children," she said.

PEOPLE's National Congress Party leader Peter O'Neill is calling on the Government to make public details of the billion kina domestic bond raising recently announced by Treasurer Ian Ling-Stuckey.

O'Neill, the Ialibu-Pangia MP and former prime minister, claimed that the "hidden fact is that the new billion Kina debt will come with interest as high as 9.5 per cent".

"And this is after Ling-Stuckey criticising the sovereign bond raised in 2018 at an interest rate of 8.375 per cent," O'Neill said.

He said it was misleading for Ling-Stuckey to say that the debt raising was a "great outcome".

"Our successful sovereign bond was for 10 years, whereas the new Ling-Stuckey debt will be for two to five years. So the interest rate should have been much lower. It is not," O'Neill said.

O'Neill said with Ling-Stuckey now talking about going after another K1.5 billion bond raising, "it appears that available domestic loan funds to government have been exhausted".

He said the K1bil bond money came from BPNG (K200 million), Bank South Pacific (K500 million), Nambawan Super (K50 million) and Nasfund (K250 million).

"The teacher gave my niece a five-meter material. That afternoon we completed 45 masks which she took to school the next day," she said.

"When the other teachers saw the masks, they asked my niece to ask us to sew masks for them also."

Yangoru-Saussia in East Sepik is continuing the implementation of the national water, sanitation and hygiene (Wash) policy 2015 despite donors withdrawing funding, an MP says.

District MP Richard Maru, on Thursday during a presentation of K700, 000 from the district development authority (DDA) to Oxfam International, said that the non-government organisation would complete the project starting at Munji, Holik, Yaremboim and Maringe villages.

Maru said 19 out of the 96 wards in the district would have complete water supply and sanitation systems at the completion of the three projects and further funding would be released for another two projects.

He said Wash was directly linked to improved health and sanitation and it was a priority for the district.

The project would be delivered after costing was done by Oxfam, whether it was a gravity-fed water supply system or provision of tanks with concrete, roofing iron and gutter for rain water collection.

A senior lecturer at the University of Papua New Guinea was among six people who died in a road accident at Baruni Road in Port Moresby at the weekend.

A land-cruiser, believed to be hired, was carrying seven people – three young women and four men – when it collided with a construction truck at about mid-day on Saturday.

Six people from the vehicle died instantly while the sole survivor, reportedly a female, is fighting for her life at the Port Moresby General Hospital's intensive care unit. The victims were all from the highlands.

Senior lecturer in the School of Journalism and Public Relations, Kaleamen Indistange, was among the dead. He was from the Kaikin tribe in the Wapenamanda electorate in Enga.

About 170 passengers were rescued late last Thursday in Magarida, Central province, after bad weather forced a ship to abandon its planned trip to Port Moresby, reports the *Sunday Chronicle*.

The ship, *Kimbe Queen*, also reported to be a sister ship of *Rabaul Queen* that sank off Finschhafen last Thursday morning, was en route to Port Moresby from Alotau carrying mostly students when the skipper forced the ship to take refuge at Walai Island off Kupiano.

Captain Tommy Joseph was reported to have slowed the speed of the ship and avoided a certain disaster that would have seen two major shipping disasters happening within a few hours of each other. The skipper then navigated the ship safely into the leeside of the island.

Continuous bad weather has forced the ship to be stranded at Kupiano and the passengers are safe and well as witnessed by the reporter.

ELECTORAL Commissioner Patilias Gamato is asking the Government for the balance of K3.95 million from its budget to settle debts to service providers during the Menyamya by election in Morobe.

Gamato said the commission budgeted for K6.1 million but received only K2.15 million from the Treasury Department.

"We submitted for K6.1 million, so far the Government has released K2.5 million," he said.

"I'm asking the Government for additional funding so we can pay the temporary election workers and security allowances and, of course, the general service providers like hire cars."

On Friday, Gamato returned the writ for the Menyamya by-election to Governor-General Sir Bob Dadae.

Speaking at the Government House after the occasion, Gamato said the event marked the conclusion of a successful by-election.

He added that when Parliament resumed next month, Benjamin Philip would be sworn by as a member elect for Menyamya.

PRIME Minister James Marape has assured the people that he would make public the internal audit done by Police Minister Bryan Kramer into how Covid-19 funds have been spent once he receives a copy.

Marape said that it was public money and they would make the report public once it was completed.

"I have asked him to furnish the report at the earliest so whenever I get the report, I will get it out in public as soon as it's available," he said.

"I give my assurance to everyone.

"I think the public debate is on the K23 million (that was drawn down from the K45 million approved by NEC (National Executive Council) for NDOH's (National Department of Health) Covid-19 Response and Preparedness Plans.

"That K23 million was placed into the department's trust account so for public assurance, that trust account is not a one-man signatory account.
